Many dogs fear loud noise.

In fact up to 50% of dogs show typical signs of fear in response to loud noises making it one of the most common behavioural concerns in dogs.1





Fear doesn't get better over time

Noise anxiety often deteriorates and over time even smaller stimuli may provoke an intense response. Without treatment noise anxiety often generalises, causing dogs to react to even normal everyday sounds.

Hold the plunger and unlock the ring-stop by turning it towards you.



Move ring

Selecting the dose



a Unlock Hold the plunger and unlock the ring-stop by turning it towards you.



A Set dose and lock

Position the ring-stop so that the required number of dots shows between the ring-stop and the barrel. Lock the ring-stop.



Pull the cap strongly while holding the barrel (the cap is very tight).





Dose into cheek

Place the oral syringe tip between the dog's cheek and gum and press the plunger until the ringstop causes the plunger to stop.



Not swallowed

If the gel is swallowed, it may not be effective.
